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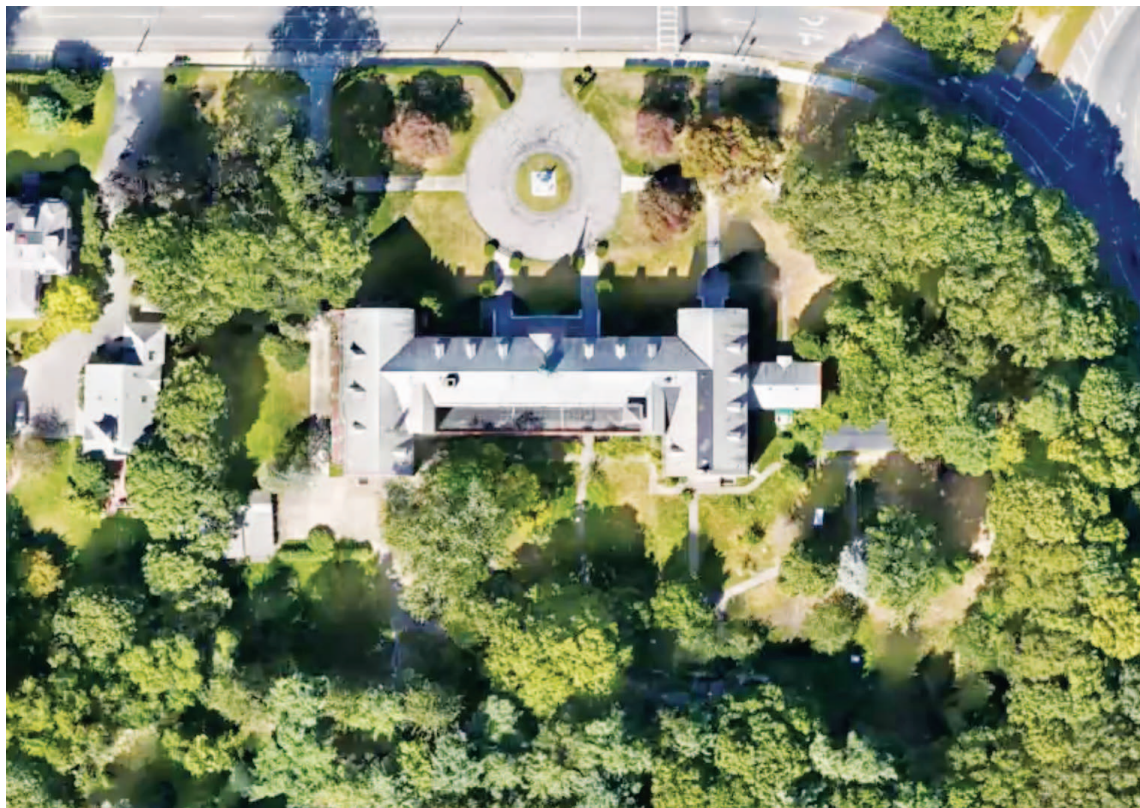

Two-and-a-half-year delay costly for 920 Centre Street Arboretum still opposed

Design-Build firm Sixteen Penny has put forward three plans for the development of the Poor Clare Sisters monastery at 920 Centre Street over the past 2.5 years, and all have been opposed by the Arnold Arboretum and a host of Jamaica Hills homeowners.

The third plan was filed as a supplemental notification on June 23, and the Boston Planning De-

partment (BPD) sponsored a heavily attended Article 80 public meeting on July 8.

Then things got messy with the Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council (JPNC).

“The required (sic) Article 80 presentation to the JPNC housing committee did not occur,” JPNC chair Alcurtis Clark told The Bulletin. “The community was not afforded the opportunity to review and discuss the proposal through the (sic) established public review process,” Clark said.

After two weeks of mixed communication, Sixteen Penny was offered a last-minute time slot at the July 28 JPNC meeting.

John Holland, CEO of Sixteen Penny, repeated his July 8 Article 80 presentation: A steel frame, five-story, three-building complex of 158 units – 79 market-rate condominiums and 79 apartments. A total of 36 apartments would be affordable at 60 percent area me-

Yu and Perkins win, other incumbents stay seated Yu wins by 546 votes

With 100 percent of precincts reporting in the Massachusetts State Senate Norfolk and Suffolk Democratic primary, challenger Persis Yu has won against incumbent Michael Rush.

With a total of 30,262 votes cast, Yu garnered 15,404 and Rush took in 14,858 votes. Yu ran a progressive campaign throughout, while Rush ran on his credentials, veteran programs and the Norwood Hospital eminent domain bill 5553 that passed earlier this summer.

In the Suffolk and Middlesex District, it was another very close race as incumbent William Brownsberger defeated challenger Daniel Lander with 11,997 votes to Lander's 11,936.

For the district attorney races, incumbent Kevin Hayden beat out challengers Linda Champion and Rachel Rollins, taking in 38,227 votes to Champion's 19,770 and Rollins' 18,623.

In a campaign statement, Perkins said she was grateful for the support.

Zero Dale now totally preserved

Sherrin Woods now totally whole

Last week, the Boston City Council voted to accept a conservation restriction for 0 Dale St. adjacent to the Sherrin Woods Urban Wild on the Hyde Park and Roslindale borders.

The move was somewhat perfunctory; Boston Mayor Michelle Wu announced the move to purchase the land back in 2024 through eminent domain. But the full process of acquiring land for public use and then making it conservation land is a bit more complicated than just the city taking it.

If it had remained just public land, there would be no legal reason that the city couldn't sell the land back to private hands

Allston’s Sisterbridge hosting free thrift store

Raising money for inclusion



Allston Brighton's Sisterbridge is hosting a free thrift shop next week for any residents in need.

The Allston Brighton-based group Sisterbridge is hosting a free thrift shop on Sept. 12 from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Presentation Center, 640 Washington St., Brighton.

Sisterbridge Founder Selena Daley said the thrift store is a way to connect multi-racial girls and mono-racial girls. She said the organization comes from a place of building community.

“I saw a gap in the fact that a lot of mixed girls felt out of place, and there weren’t really a lot of resources to help them,” she said. “So we do a lot of programming around talks about colorism, hair events, online discussions about politics and identity, and one thing we discuss is the idea of having a platform and using it.”

Colorism, according to the Oxford Dictionary – <https://gvimes.link/clrsm> – is the hierarchical rating of persons by the lightness of their skin tone. While historical examples of this are more closely related to racism – sorting people ethnically based on an outdated idea of race – colorism relates to how those ideas still echo down the ages to today, and how it can relate to health outcomes and medical treatment – <https://gvimes.link/clrsmrvw>

Daley said through their organizing, the group currently has 1,500 followers on TikTok, and she thought since they have that platform, as she said, they should use it to help people. So she said they thought the free thrift store was a good place to start.

“Brands were reaching out about sending PR, but we were

like, ‘We want this to go to a good place,’” she said. “Brands sent us brand new hoodies and pajamas for the event, and we also did a drive to collect items for the store. That’s kind of the inspiration behind it. If we have the resources to help, we wanted to help the local community.”

Each thrift store patron will be given a limited number of tickets they can use to pick out what they’d like and make it fair for everybody.

“So no one is being charged for anything, everything is completely free,” she said. “For example, a T-shirt might be one ticket or a rug might be two.”

Daley said the organization has all its leadership roles currently filled, but volunteers are always welcome.

Her impact reached far beyond just Brook Farm

The August 27, 2026 edition of The Bulletin included a story about Sophia Dana Ripley, who co-founded Brook Farm with her husband, George. She was an accomplished educator and early feminist. Part one explored Sophia’s early life, including her founding of a girls’ school, her involvement in her husband’s Transcendental Club, the feminist writing she published, and the founding of Brook Farm.

Brook Farm (1841-1847) was a Transcendentalist-inspired utopian experiment. Despite its brief existence, it had a lasting influence on American social and intellectual thought. The community appealed to young Bostonians seeking a simpler, more idealistic way of life. Women were paid the same as men and considered autonomous from their husbands.

Sophia was in charge of the schools, and also taught history and modern languages. Brook Farm became well-known for its education; attracting many famous male and female writers. The schools also enrolled international students from as far away as Cuba and the Philippines. Notable scholars included Ralph Waldo Emerson’s nephew, Margaret Fuller’s brother, and Robert Gould

Shaw. Sophia only missed two classes in six years.

Ora Gannett Sedgwick was just a teenager when she moved to Brook Farm. Decades later, she wrote an acclaimed autobiographical account of her time in the community. Titled “A Girl of Sixteen at Brook Farm,” it was published in 1900 in the Atlantic Monthly magazine. Her mother was familiar with Sophia’s reputation as a remarkable teacher and wanted her daughter to receive the best possible education. Sedgwick noted that Mrs. Ripley had elegant manners and perfect self-control, and was a positive influence on her students. In addition to overseeing the schools and teaching, Sophia spent many hours cleaning and doing laundry at the Hive — she was considered the hardest working member of Brook Farm.

Sophia was tall, graceful, and had a powerful presence. “There was something so lovely in her face,” recalled one of her nieces. “Perhaps the English would have called it countenance. Her exquisite manners, and her low, beautifully modulated voice added to the charm.”

Transcendentalism views nature as a divine space where humans find spiritual and moral guidance. Many Transcenden-

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Allston Christmas:

311 highlights

Quiet weekend



Hundreds of 311 complaints were made this week, as is tradition for Allston Christmas.

Allston Christmas has come and gone, and while some blocks might still have a few “gifts” leftover on the sidewalk, Boston’s 311 complaint lists are forever.

Allston Christmas is the nickname given to the student move-in period at the end of fall. Many times students leave unwanted items out for interested pickers to come and get, and so the nickname stuck.

Furniture, appliances, arts and crafts – if you can name it, it’s been left out.

But this year has been relatively quiet. According to 311.Boston.gov, the biggest, and likely most understandable, infractions have been illegal parking. Many moving trucks, out-of-state plates and vans were cited during the last five days in Allston and Brighton.

In Allston, there were a total of 63 instances of illegal parking that Allston sent to 311. But Brighton came in almost double that at 104 complaints. Many of the Brighton complaints came from Radnor Road.

Some notable instances included several occasions blocking streets or driveways, several hydrant parkings, and one Cyber Truck parked in the bus lane on the Leo Birmingham Parkway (a Cyber Truck was also spotted in front of a hydrant on Brighton Avenue in Allston).

A somewhat significant issue apparently came from the North End, where an electrical box at the intersection of Commercial Street and Hanover Street was knocked over by a vehicle. The report states that: “Got bumped over in Allston Xmas. Appears to have live wires exposed.”

There were several in-

stances of damaged signs reported, as well as several instances of improper trash storage throughout the Allston and Brighton neighborhoods.

Rodent reports were also, as per usual, very numerous.

As to junk on the sidewalk, reported finds included several couches, tables, chairs, lamps, an ornate solid wood coffee table, fans, a pet carrier, book cases – so many book cases! – several dog waste bags (hopefully unrelated to Allston Xmas), several mattresses, glass shards, and more.

talists found refuge at Brook Farm. “They were of cultivated families, and were nearly all from the city and neighborhoods of Boston. Their hearts were open to the tender influence of buds and blossoms, fresh springing grass and the bubbling brook. They watched birds of various plumage; the oriole, who hung his basket nest from branches of the elm, the robin redbreast who built in the thick branches of the firs, and the sparrow,” John Codman documented in “Brook Farm: Historic and Personal Memoirs”: “There were plenty of wild flowers in the fields and in the woods nearby.”

In Sedgwick’s memoir, she reflected on the bubbling brook at the farm, describing it as a friend that expressed different emotions. Sixty years later, she could still vividly hear the running water. “I often wondered if such a place, so pure, refined, and entirely democratic, could have been started in any other place than in Boston or its vicinity,” recalled Sedgwick.

Theodore Parker, Emerson and Fuller were all frequent visitors, but they declined to join the community. About 70 to 120 people lived at Brook Farm, while it attracted over a thousand visitors each year. The community enjoyed hosting dances and plays inside the Hive, the main building.

Brook Farm was never financially stable—farming was

unprofitable due to the rocky soil and the lack of labor. The construction of multiple new buildings created deep debts. In 1844, George created a new constitution for Brook Farm based on Charles Fourier’s Phalanx system. This system was a utopian socialist model where people lived and worked together in cooperative communities, centered around a communal building, the “phalanstery.” While some members embraced it, others believed this new model was too rigid and they left the commune.

Food became more and more scarce. In 1845, an outbreak of smallpox worsened conditions at Brook Farm. A few months later, a fire destroyed a large new community building that was still under construction. In May 1846, the Ripleys left the farm. Their book collection was sold at auction to help pay off the utopia’s debts. Sophia called their original optimism about the community “childish, empty, and sad.”

After Brook Farm’s collapse in 1847, the Ripleys moved to New York, where Sophia taught at a local school while George worked as a newspaper editor. Their relationship became strained – Sophia no longer agreed with her husband’s beliefs and converted to Catholicism. She devoted the last ten years of her life to charitable causes and served on the board

of a shelter that supported women leaving prostitution.

Sophia died of cancer in 1861 and is buried in the Dana Family Tomb at the Old Burying Ground, located in Cambridge. She is featured on the Boston Women’s Heritage Trail as one of Boston’s “trailblazing women.”

The Sophia Ripley School, which stood on Temple St. in West Roxbury, was named in her honor. Some community members have fond memories of the elementary school, including the kind teachers, churning butter in kindergarten, and the Maypole dances. It opened in the 1920s but closed in 1981 due to budget cuts.

The Dana family has deep Boston roots, but their influence has extended across the world. Sophia’s grandfather, Francis Dana (1743-1811), was a Founding Father who played a significant role in the American Revolution. He was appointed to the Continental Congress, signed the Articles of Confederation, and was a Minister to Russia. Charles Dana (1881-1975) is another notable descendant of the Dana family; he was a businessman and philanthropist who founded the Dana Foundation. The Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston is named in honor of the foundation’s support.

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WR’s Anna’s Pals prepping for Bourne 5K

Fundraising for recovery beach house

West Roxbury’s Anna’s Pals is fundraising for the upcoming Bourne To Run 5K at the Cape on Nov. 7 to raise money for the Beach House.

The Beach House for Immunocompromised Children is Anna’s Pals current project. Located down the Cape in Bourne, the historic Ella F. Hoxie School is being transformed into a therapeutic respite facility that will be aimed at bringing care and a much-needed change of scenery for immunocompromised children.

Those living with conditions that severely inhibit the immune system are subject to severe isolation. Infections of any kind can be fatal, and so the medical advice is to keep patients away from anything that could lead to an infection.

Anna’s Pals founder Kristen Jerome said the idea of the Beach House came from her

daughter Anna. Anne was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia when she was 14 years old. She received a bone marrow transplant as part of her treatment and was under severe restrictions, but in 2014, after a 15-month battle, she passed away.

Jerome founded Anna’s Pals in her memory. The Beach House project came from Anna’s love of the beach, and Jerome said bringing children under similar or the same restrictions (as her daughter had) to the beach is the goal of the project.

“As of today, there are camps and other escapes for medically compromised children, but nothing specifically designed for immunocompromised children,” she said. “So the kids we serve can’t go to Camp Sunshine or Hole-In-The-Wall Gang – all those things for sick children, because these kids’ medical needs are so specific these

“We’re open to everyone – we’re not just limited to multicultural girls,” she said. “It’s for any girl who’s ever struggled with identity or to fit in, especially when it comes to race.”

Daley said they host colorism talks and have already gone to schools in Watertown and Jamaica Plain. You can sign up to host discussions at the group’s website, <https://www.sisterbridgecollective.org/>

Daley said the talks and the work are incredibly fun and rewarding.

“When I get home from school, this is what I rush to,” she said. “I love doing this. I have a huge passion for social justice and racial justice, and the stories I’ve heard from girls in this organization and the work we get to do, it brings me so much joy. To see that we’re helping women like this, I mean we get stories from girls telling us they’ve never had anybody to open up to about being stuck between these two worlds. It’s so beautiful.”

camps can’t meet them. Camp Sunshine is great, but these kids can’t go there because their risk of infection is so high.”

So the Beach House is a clean environment close to the sea (the Cape Cod Canal, specifically), and the idea is to allow patrons a break from clean rooms and other such sterile environments (metaphorically speaking).

The Beach House is being designed with a medical-grade filtration system, antibacterial surfaces, touchless fixtures, and mildew-resistant building material. It will also have two pediatric nurses on staff, two admin

staff, an indoor recreation facility, and one video game/movie suite.

Jerome said the group recently received a serious chunk of funding in the form of a grant from Mass Development, and has also received funding from Insight Realty, the Corrib Charitable Trust, Golf Fights Cancer, the Robert and Michelle Goodnow Family Foundation, Parkway Real Estate, Aegon

Transamerica Foundation, and the Bourne Community Preservation Committee (CPC).

But more is always needed. “Through that Mass Development grant we were able to finish the structural planning, and so our architectural designs and engineering will be taken care of by the state,” she said.

dian income (AMI), and two would be offered for mobile voucher holders. That makes 24 percent of the proposed housing affordable units.

The three-building, U-shaped complex of brick and terracotta would be set back 50 feet from the Arboretum boundary and 80-to-90 feet from Centre Street, all sides of which would be thickly planted with trees and shrubs.

Despite an advertised and well-attended Boston Planning meeting two weeks earlier, most JPNC members seemed unaware of the development plans. Dave Baron chair of the JP Zoning Committee (JPZC) was the only council member to attend the July 8 meeting and he told the July 28 council meeting he was concerned.

“Three different designs,” Baron said. “I’m concerned about all this expense just to appease one neighbor. It’s not worth a ton of money to appease this one abutter. [The developer] is offering a 50-foot setback enforced by an easement to appease the Arboretum.”

The council wasn’t appeased. It wanted an extension of the comment period and requested that Sixteen Penny make a presentation to the Aug. 18 Jamaica Plain Housing Committee (JPHC).

The Planning Department agreed to extend the comment period (for the third time) until August 28.

Between July 28 and August 18, Sixteen Penny got some favorable press.

“Boston desperately needs housing. Why can’t [the] plan for vacant monastery move forward?” asked Trea Lavery in her Aug. 16 MassLive blog. “Sixteen

Penny is on the third version of the proposed building design [since 2021] but has yet to get the blessing of the immediate neighbor, the Arnold Arboretum. Arboretum Director Ned Friedman has repeatedly asserted that the redevelopment would cast shadows on the trees.”

About 45 callers were on the Aug 18 JPHC virtual meeting, and Holland repeated the presentation he gave to the JPNC.

All summer, Holland has been specific about to whom 920 Centre Street was being marketed: “The condominiums are for people who are downsizing [like] ‘empty nesters’ and the apartments are for people who work in the area and can live nearby.”

“One of the drivers of housing is employment. There are two employment centers,” Holland told the housing committee, “The Faulkner Hospital with about 2,500 jobs and the Longwood Medical Area with 68,000 jobs. There are 1,000 jobs along Centre Street, all within a short walk to transit.”

“People are commuting long distances,” Holland said, “There’s an employment demand for housing in this area.”

Four council members spoke in opposition of the plans for 920 Centre, but six neighbors called in their support, one of whom was Lisa Johnson, who said she lived on the Jamaica way.

Johnson questioned the costs of each of the plans. “Each iteration increases the costs of this project,” she said.

Holland agreed. The two-and-half-year delay has seen increased interest rates and architect fees, he said, on top of the \$2 million for demolition, and the large trees on the 50-foot set back.

The Bulletin and Holland met on a Teams call on Aug. 24 and he went into more detail. “The [three] redesigns cost \$1.5 million,” he said. “We expected \$500,000. Moving the new building back 50 feet required demolishing the old convent. That’s \$750,000 for demolition.”

No one on the neighborhood council has ever considered the Poor Clare Sisters, but Holland said he has. “We couldn’t do it in sequence,” Holland said, by acquiring the property first and then relocating the Sisters.

“We have the monastery under agreement, but we found a perfect place for them [the Sisters] in Westwood,” he said. “We couldn’t wait. We’re carrying the interest on that property. Its not an insignificant business cost.”

The added costs of 920 Centre Street “are going to be borne by the market-rate condominiums,” Holland said, estimating an additional \$85,000 added to the price of each condominium.

At the July 8 Article 80 meeting Holland said the going condominium price in Jamaica Plain is \$750 to \$850 a square foot.

“It’s difficult as it is, this excludes the affordable component,” he said.

Holland repeated what he’s said at four public meetings this summer, “This is being funded with private equity, regular commercial banks.”

“The market-rate condominiums are driving the affordable units, but if the condominiums are too expensive, buyers will look elsewhere,” Holland said.

“I’m waiting for the Arboretum’s response,” Holland said referring to a meeting on Aug. 20 between a variety of city officials and Arboretum Director, Ned Friedman.

“He wants us to reduce the

height of the wings,” Holland said. “That’s a modification of design.”

“The comment period ended Aug. 28. If the city wants more changes, [it will require] a fourth iteration. This will be an impact; it will be financially impossible,” he said.

Reducing the size, reducing the number of units will have an impact.

“We may no longer have the ability to do that. We’re approaching the unit density,” Holland said.

“This will affect the Sisters,” Holland said.

Jon Chesto and Shirley Leung wrote in The Boston Globe on Aug. 20 that the delay is affect-

Michael Perry, Minister Provincial of the Franciscan Friars [with which the Poor Clares are affiliated] asked that the project move as “expeditiously as possible” in an Aug. 11 letter to Sister leader Mary Veronica McGuff with Archbishop Richard Henning copied.

Jerome said, however, that there is still a lot of work to do, including asbestos removal in the old school.

“So we’ll have to do some abatement for that,” she said. “And when that’s done we’ll do the interior demolition, and that’s what we’re working on getting funding for now.”

And so this will be the second year Anna’s Pals has participated in the Bourne To Run 5K.

“Last year was our first race and I was expecting just 50 people or so but we actually had a bit over a 100, which was fabulous,” she said. “The weather was very nice and sunny and it was just a really nice, flat, running route right along the canal.”

The project itself still has a ways to go, but Jerome said she was gratified that the Town of Bourne really stepped up for it, especially as it voted to give Anna’s Pals funds from the Community Preservation Act

Fund through the CPC. Funding disbursements like that generally require a vote from a municipality’s Annual Town Meeting to go through.

“It’s important that the neighborhood bought in, and they clearly did,” she said. “The building is an historic school house under historic preservation. So the people in the town are really connected to the building. And they seem really happy that we’re taking a building that was made for children and giving it back to children. So the town is just very supportive of our work.”

But Jerome said it was all worth it, because they really couldn’t build a better site for the Beach House if they wanted to.

“The building is beautiful the way it is, and we’re really lucky. Because of the historic preservation aspect, we’re allowed to change the interior but we have to keep the exterior,” she said. “We’re very fortunate that the

building is already basically designed for what we want to do. It has eight classrooms, and we’ll be converting them into eight two-bedroom apartments. So we’ll be able to service eight families at a time. We wouldn’t have been able to design it that way, it just happened to come that way, which is even better.”

later on. A conservation restriction basically puts the control of the land in the hands of another entity that has no material reason to sell it. So, if the city does decide it wants to sell the land, the holder of the restriction would have to sign off on it.

This seemingly administrative vote brings to an end the decades-long saga of 0 Dale St. The neighbors of the area, especially the Dale Street

Neighborhood Watch, have been fighting to keep the land unbuilt and wooded, much like the adjacent Sherrin Woods, for at least the last 20 years, if not longer.

Dale Street Neighborhood Watch co-founder Kim O’Connell worked on keeping the woods from development with co-chair Beth Columbo during much of the Watch’s existence. The area remains a piece of greenspace at least in part due to their efforts.

At a City Council Hearing on the restriction on Aug. 21, Parks Commissioner Cathy Baker-Eclipse said the acqui-

sition was done through the Community Preservation Act (CPA) fund process, and that the Conservation Agent for 0 Dale will be the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation, members of which also fought to keep the parcel woodland during a proposed development process for 28 condos back in 2023. The city took the parcel through eminent domain for about \$530,000.

The restriction basically spells out how the property can be used by the public and what is there currently.

For 0 Dale, what you see is what you get. Passive wooded recreation.

requesting that the court enter a formal Decree of Complete Settlement including the allowance of a final account, 1st, 2nd, 3d and other such relief as may be requested in the Petition.

You have the right to obtain a copy of the petition from the Petitioner or at the court. You have a right to object to this proceeding. To do so, you or your attorney must file a written appearance and objection at this court before: 10:00 a.m. on the return day of 9/24/2026. This is NOT a hearing date, but a deadline by which you must file a written appearance and objection if you object to this proceeding. If you fail to file a timely written appearance and objection followed by an affidavit of objections within thirty (30) days of the return day, action may be taken without further notice to you.

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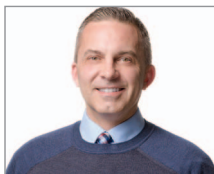
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
