New apartment house for 406 South Huntington Ave Usual objections made

Number 406 South Huntington Avenue is probably the most centrally located new development in Jamaica Plain: around it is the Whole Foods, the Connolly Branch of the Boston Public Library, JP Auto Services, JP Laundromat Center, a 7-11, CVS, an Ethiopian restaurant, retail cannabis and Bus 39; to say nothing of Mann & Rogers Funeral Home across the street.

Frank Schillace of Lochstead Street proposes a five-story, 48-unit apartment house to replace the long vacant one-story building built in 1928 as a parking garage.

Schillace, his attorney Richard Lynds, and architect Monte French gave a presentation to the Jamaica Plain Housing Committee (JPHC) on March 17.

Lynds is no stranger to the area's dynamics; he was the attorney for the contentious 561 Centre St. development.

French – a South End architect – was the architect for 3171

Easter Service well attended at The Gardens Patrons see the sunrise, through the rain, for the holiday

Seventy community members from West Roxbury and other neighborhoods gathered at The Gardens at Gethsemane Cemetery on Baker St. on April 5, Easter Sunday, to attend the 30th annual sunrise service. This event brought together families and long-time friends as they celebrated the holiday in a non-denominational ceremony.

Attendees gathered underneath the tent to listen to saxophone music played by Elan Trotman, a professor at Berklee College of Music, and listen to songs performed by Athena Wilson and Demetrios Tsaniklides, Jr.

Additionally, Pastor Pete Kane of the Calvary Baptist Church in Dedham gave a 20-minute sermon that described how “sorrow

Parking sparks philosophical debates

To drive or not to drive at 4301 Wash

The age old question: if you build it, where will they park?

That was the big topic at the Boston Planning Board meeting recently for the proposed Roslindale buildings at 4301 Washington St.

The project boasts 16 condo units, three of which will be affordable under the city's Inclusionary Development Policy, no zoning relief required (thanks to Squares+Streets (S+S) – more on that later), and seven parking spaces.

Developer and managing partner of Alpine Property Group Steve Vettori said the company bought the current property about a year ago, and said it has been, "Vacant, vacant for some time." He said

three years ago the company built 11 Taft Hill Terrace, a similar 16-unit condo building.

"That was kind of our first foray into developing in Roslindale, and then on the heels of the S+S initiative, we thought there might be opportunity to revisit Roslindale and purchased 4301 Washington just over a year ago," he said.

Several residents spoke in favor of the project, including several direct abutters, but some spoke against the project particularly in terms of parking spaces.

"When you have 40 bedrooms in 16 units with seven parking spaces, it seems to me that's going to take up a significant percentage of the on-street parking places in the Village," said resident Doug Creed. "What is to be done about that?"

Boston Planning Project Manager Tyler Ross said the parking numbers came out of the S+S process, which was done over the course of 2024 and 2025, and now parking requirements are based on floor area ration, as listed in the S+S zoning amendment – <https://gvimes.link/parkingreqs>

"I think the thinking in bringing a proposal like this with limited parking is the future tenants, or homeowners as they are here, not all of them will be car owners," Ross said. "You'll be looking at this building and see it doesn't have enough parking for your two cars. But those who do commute with the MBTA or bike, this might be the perfect home for them."

Creed pointed out that, ac-

Reardon's closing after 52 years

Liquidation sale this Saturday

Parkway mainstay Reardon's Electrical Supply is closing after 52 years serving West Roxbury, Roslindale and beyond.

The company was founded by James Reardon Sr. back in 1974. His grandson, Jay Reardon, said his grandfather built the company on relationships he formed while working "oddball" jobs throughout Boston.

"He had really established a lot of relationships in the electrical business prior to opening the shop," he said. "He understood that, at least back then, it was a small group of individuals doing electrical supply. This was obviously way before the big Home Depots and Lowes of the world, but he captured a lot of that business throughout the 70s, 80s and 90s."

Jay said his grandfather started on Belgrade Avenue and moved up to West Roxbury in 2010. He said his father, James Jr., was 18 when they started and he took it over throughout the 90s when James Sr. passed away. He said the business was focused on whatever an electrician would need to make a house a home.

"Really all the things you don't see behind the wall," he said. "We did have some services where we would test equipment but it was mostly supplies. Most of the business was contractors walking in for big jobs, residential and commercial. Over the years, we supplied honestly half of the Greater Boston area. We supplied tons of churches and parishes in the area, even the statehouse at one point, all the way through big pharmaceutical companies – even to this day funnily enough – and we've been able to serve a lot of different organizations and people throughout the years. Even a lot of the municipalities and hospitals in the area. From the VA hospitals, Brockton Hospital and local hospitals; we've served a variety of people and businesses over the years, which has been great and really put us to the test really."

James Reardon Jr. passed last year in 2025, and Jay said while the business wasn't something his father pushed him into, they kept the business going for him and his memory. But now Jay has his own career, and the family can't keep it going now.

"I wouldn't say I was working there all the time, and that's a big part of why we're moving on," he said. "My father never forced me to work here or take anything over. I went to college and have my own career, and while he was sick we wanted to keep this going and keep it alive for him."

Jay emphasized that the business was always a family operation, which included his grandmother Gladys Reardon pitching in when she was needed.

"Growing up in it, it was so close-knit," he said. "We had uncles and aunts working there, my grandmother was involved in establishing things and working the office and stuff. It was very family-oriented, and throughout the years we employed a lot of family and friends as well as others. We shared a lot of great years with family and friends."

Reardon said because of this, nobody in the family was really far away from the business.

"There was a lot of talk during normal business hours and off hours too," he said. "It was just impressive to see how things changed over the years. There has been a big change in the market with how people get these things now. There have been a lot of acquisitions within the electrical supply industry, and I can tell you confidently that we, along with maybe one or two other shops in Boston, were some of the only independent electrical supply companies. Most of what you Google or see in Boston are owned by bigger companies."

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HPNA 'stunned' by proposed S+S zones

BFD to install free smoke/monoxide detectors in HP

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) met on Thursday, April 2 and led off with President Mimi Turchinetz's comments regarding the Planning Department's proposed Squares + Streets (S+S) zoning map for Cleary Square that was released for public review on March 17.

"It was not what people anticipated," Turchinetz said of the map – which would allow for seven-story construction on Hyde Park Avenue and River Street at Cleary Square, and four-story mixed-use construction in nearby residential streets, all without required parking minimums. "In fact, it was far more aggressive – in terms of height and density – than we had thought."

At the core of City Hall's S+S initiative is the rezoning of neighborhood business districts to allow more residential development in the form of bigger and taller buildings – likely at the cost of the previously-required commercial/business/active-use footprint.

Since early 2024, the Planning Department has been engaged in this process for Cleary Square – initially describing it, repeatedly, as a consensus-driven community collaboration. However, it consistently refused to address the neighborhood's zoning questions and concerns in any detail.

Consequently, an ad hoc committee was formed to draft a petition to change the S+S

amendment (Article 26) to buffer its six zones, which had been very quickly codified in April 2024.

This led to the committee's engagement in behind-the-scenes City Hall communications that resulted in the Planning Department drafting two new S+S zones. They were adopted, as were other committee-informed changes to Article 26, by the Boston Zoning Commission (BZC).

On Jan. 22, the ad hoc committee held an in-person public meeting at which its proposed S+S map was voted on and approved, in consensus, by about 50 neighborhood attendees.

On March 18, the Planning Department held a virtual community meeting regarding its proposed zoning map and plan for Cleary Square, during which most of the commenting attendees voiced varying levels of shock, dismay, and betrayal regarding the selected zones and their placements.

It also hosted an in-person meeting on April 8 about the same thing, and it is also holding regular virtual and in-person office hours before the public comment period closes on May 1.

After a close-out meeting sometime in May, the final S+S map and plan is slated to go to the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) Board for approval on June 18, after which the Cleary Square S+S map will go to the BZC on July 15 for adoption into the zoning code.

After that, those upsized S+S zoning districts will go into ef-

fect.

"The neighborhood really needs to push back and get something more of what we think is in keeping with the neighborhood," Turchinetz pressed on, despite the S+S clock winding down.

In the evening's main appointment, Eversource Project Engagement Senior Specialist Cody Diehl gave an update on the energy provider's Greater Dorchester Area Initiative, which will build a new electrical substation in Dorchester and connect it to substations in Hyde Park and West Roxbury – both of which are operating at greater than 95 percent capacity. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2028 and will bring overload

relief and more reliable service to those three neighborhoods, as well as to Jamaica Plain and Mattapan.

Planning for the project began in 2023 and is now in its engineering and design phase, with two sets of potential transmission routes (underground cable lines) mapped between the

proposed New England Avenue substation and the existing ones in Hyde Park and West Roxbury.

Both potential Hyde Park routes follow Wood Avenue, Tacoma Street, Huntington Avenue, Clare Avenue, and Ameri-

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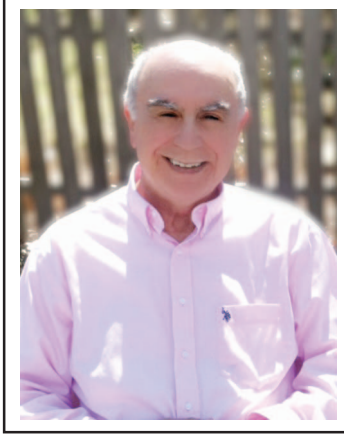
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Shame on Catholic Charities

For years all the cardboard generated from the truckloads has been recycled by placing it into one of the two large dumpsters – the one for recycling. It was first thought that only nearby residents were occasionally contaminating the recycle dumpster by putting in their trash or landscapers putting in their cuttings. But, more recently, the dumpster for to-be-recycled cardboard, has been contaminated regularly, so much so that the trash hauler has discontinued its recycling efforts. It seems that only recently, after expensive fencing has been erected to thwart nearby residents and passersby from depositing their non-recyclable trash in the recyclable-cardboard only bin, has the system irrevocably and ironically broken down. When non-recyclables are mixed in with the cardboard, the load becomes contaminated and is of no use: it must be discarded as if the contents were

all garbage, trash, etc.

It seems that the Catholic Charities regular staff are responsible for contaminating the recycle dumpster: who else would be heaving wooden pallets, plastic milk crates, and cartons of rotten fruit into it? This continues week after week as hundreds of pounds of cardboard are prevented from being recycled, as the “recycle” dumpster becomes merely another trash dumpster.

The shrink wrap and other such plastic are taken by a volunteer to Roche Brothers, Lowes, or Wegman's, all three of whom recycle plastic bags.

It's seems questionable to mislead teenagers, as well as adult volunteers, that their efforts to recycle are for naught, especially in light of a papal announcement by Pope Francis in 2018 called Laudato Si that encourages, nay mandates, all of us to recycle and treat Mother Earth better.

Despite this, I consider myself lucky: lucky to have a job, lucky to have an apartment I can afford, and lucky that my living conditions aren't worse. This is where I'm coming from when I approach building proposals like the one at 3716 Washington Street. Similar projects are going through the Article 80 process in my own neighborhood of Brighton. I wasn't present at the public meet-

ing for 3716 Washington, but I watched the video on the City's website.

Business owners were angry. Property owners were angry. Residents? Not so much. That's not to say they didn't have concerns, because they did—mainly regarding affordability, alleyway traffic, and the disruption that construction will cause. The longest and most impassioned comment of the night was Michael West's vehement opposition. While I understand his desire to keep Brady and Fallon's services “dignified and solemn,” I do question this as a legitimate reason to stop construction nearby. Should no work be per-

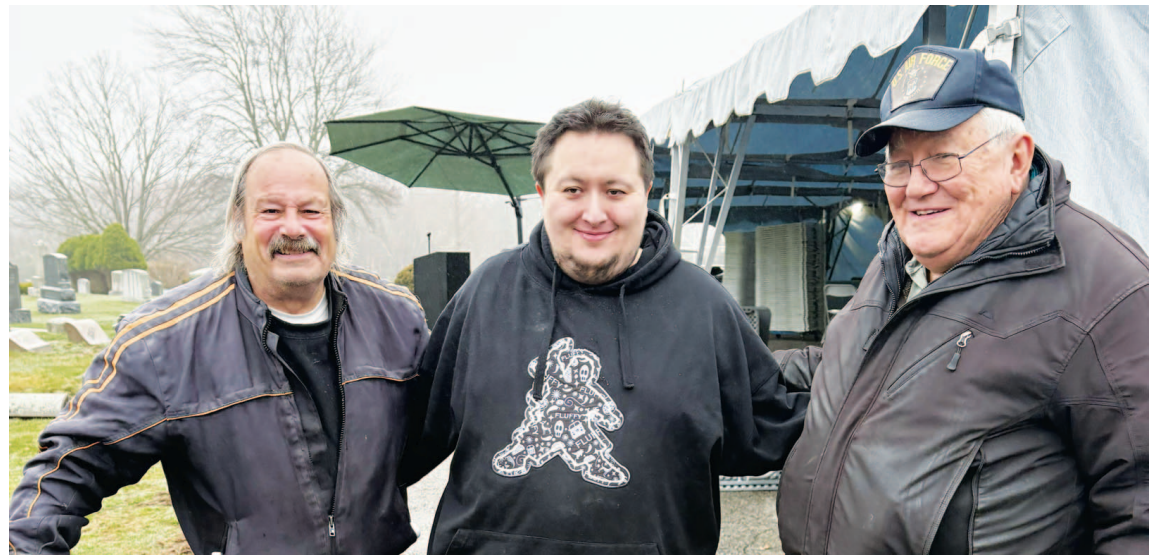
mitted in the vicinity of the funeral home as long as it operates?

The developers and the city must minimize disruption to existing residents and businesses to the greatest possible extent. The concerns voiced on this subject at the meeting were sensible. It also remains true that high-density, affordable housing near public transit hubs is what the working people of Boston need, from Brighton to JP and beyond. Each project that moves forward allows people like me to access dignified living conditions.

becomes joy,” quoting an idea presented by a passage from John 3:16 – 21.

“God brings joy to our lives not by substitution, but by transformation. But that transformation is by substitution,” Pastor Kane explained to attendees. He noted how Jesus used the metaphor of how the pain a woman experiences in childbirth transitions to the joy of becoming a mother to help his disciples understand how they will feel after his crucifixion and eventual resurrection.

“What we try and do in life sometimes is create our own joy... but there's no joy so joyful as the new birth,” he emphasized.

“We want to give the same message of rebirth,” explained Alan MacKinnon, president of The Gardens Cemetery. When MacKinnon became president in 1995, he said he visited other cemeteries in California, Texas and Florida, where they put on other events besides funerals, to bring the community members to them regularly. MacKinnon saw an opportunity to revive a service that was last held in The Gardens in the 1970s and align the cemetery with more progressive ones. “We want to bring people when it's not a sad, bad [and] scary occasion,” MacKinnon added.

Every year, The Gardens invites clergy members from different faiths, including Catholicism and Protestantism, to make the service and message of rebirth aligned with the different faiths of community members.

After the sermon and a closing music performance of “He Lives” from Wilson accompanied by Trotman, attendees enjoyed a free breakfast courtesy of Putterham Grille of Chestnut Hill. Staff filled plates with scrambled eggs, frittata, sausage and bacon for attendees, and everyone sat down to enjoy an Easter breakfast with each other.

For some, this event is a family tradition, such as with Dee and Mike O'Keefe of West Roxbury.

“I started coming here with my husband after my mother-in-law died about 30 years ago,” Dee explained. “She was a strong woman of faith who saw a lot of heart.” Dee noted that she saw branches create the shape of a heart, a country hearts tree, to reflect this idea. “You can see it if your heart is full,” she added. “Even though the sun isn't shining,” explained Mike, in relation to the rainy weather that morning, “You can see the sun rise over the tree, and you swear you saw the sermon [before you],” he added.

“I felt God in my heart,”

noted Nicole Johnson of Dorchester. When she heard Pastor Kane's sermon and ending prayer, they hit home for her. “I've been dealing with a lot of stuff in my life, and this has helped me to get through it. I realized God has been guiding me for the whole time.”

Additionally, this event brought longtime friends together for the first time in many years. Bill Lombardi, a U.S. Air Force veteran and elder of the Wollomonopoag Indian Council in Mansfield, Massachusetts saw his childhood friend for the first time in 20 years at the service.

“We knew each other since first grade,” Lombardi explained. “The sermon, music, camaraderie and the breakfast were amazing,” making the reunion memorable.

Now that this year's sunrise service has ended, Eunice Davis, who runs The Gardens' family services will begin planning 2027's service.

“It's a year-long plan,” Davis explained. “We will spread the word to churches so the message [of the sunrise service] reaches the people, so they can come together.”

Washington St. condos, the ground floor of which is the office of Egleston Square Main Streets.

Lynds explained what is apparently a new city process: "early engagement."

"Article 80 requires early meetings before filing," he said, "to understand the concerns and issues and to hear from the neighborhood."

Reportedly Schillace has made at least a brief presentation to the JP Centre-South Main Streets.

According to Michael Reiskind in a message to The Bulletin on March 16, 406 South Huntington was "purchased by a local resident Frank Schillace who has been looking at it a long time."

"He has been in touch with both the design team and economic vitality team at Centre South for several months."

Perhaps learning from the fireworks around 561 Centre St., Lynds seemed cautious.

"I want to caution people," he said. "This is a work in progress. Very, very, very early step to understand the uses, the urban planning principals on a main thoroughfare."

Lynds said it was a small project review with eight units

set aside as affordable at 60-to-70-percent area median income (AMI).

There will be 10 at-grade parking spaces at the rear of the building.

Lynds went through all 11 of the zoning categories one by one although the building needs only two variances.

French described his building on a long corner with Barbara Street a few yards from the Whole Foods parking lot.

Essentially a long box with corner inset balconies facing South Huntington, it fits almost the whole 11,000-square-foot site directly behind JP Auto Services.

"Right now we're studying the maximum build-out of the site," French said. "We're following the scale and rhythm of Barbara Street."

The ground floor will have three apartments, the lobby entry and parking access.

Most of the apartments, 31 of them, are one bedroom units; the rest two bedrooms.

There followed the almost automatic reactions – at least historically – at housing committee reviews about height and affordability.

Bernie Doherty and Alcurtis Clark objected to

five stories; they wanted a four-story building.

"I'm very concerned about the height," Doherty said, apparently forgetting that South Huntington Avenue is a wide boulevard with five-story buildings.

Kathy Brown disagreed.

"I'm totally fine with the height, it fits in pretty well," she said adding, as she almost always does at housing committee reviews, that she wanted higher affordability.

Clark wanted a four-story building with more three bedroom units.

Sarah Horsley wanted more "family sized units with more deeply affordable units." She suggested 25 percent of the units to be below 60 percent AMI.

Lynds said he has "heard the same thing all around the city. Do more. Deeper AMI. Right now we're at 60 percent."

"We're at the very early stage, continuing engagement with elected officials and applicable community groups," Lynds concluded.

"No filing yet," Lynds said. "We'll look at all your suggestions and see what we can do, and explain to you if we can't."

"Hope to be back later," he said.

The Boston Planning Department held an Article 80 Meeting last week on the proposed 145-unit rental building at 201-207 Brighton Ave. in Brighton.

DND Homes is looking to put in these units with no parking spaces and 30 affordable income-restricted units as per the city's Inclusionary Development

Policy (IDP) for 20 percent of the building affordable. The site will have 176 bike parking spaces and 822 square feet of commercial retail space on the first floor.

The proposal needs quite a bit of zoning relief and therefore will be heading to the Boston Zoning Board of Appeals for approval, though attorney representing DND Jeffrey

Drago said the commercial zone upon which the site sits only triggered three variances (which is comparatively low in Allston versus other projects). The plan needs zoning variances for exceeding allowed floor area ration (3.78 proposed 1 allowed), height in feet (35 feet allowed / 70 proposed) and rear yard setback (20 feet required 4 feet, 7 inches proposed).

The site will feature a vehicle entrance for pickup, drop-off, and rideshare on Cambridge Street.

Charlesview Housing Community Engagement Manager Oscar Lopez asked about adding more community space rather than a gym on the first

floor. He also asked about what the proponents would be doing to promote the units to seniors and families and not just young professionals and students.

"We haven't really announced anything yet because we're going through the community process and we didn't want to market it," Drago said.

Lopez said he understood but would like to see an effort geared towards elderly residents looking to downsize. Trina Murphy said they would look into doing that when the units are closer to being online. Lopez said overall, though, he appreciated the height and density of the project.

"I think it's a great project, only a couple more things need to do to get there, but honestly, if you can't build high here, I don't know where you can," he said. "Just down the way in Allston Square where Twin Donuts used to be you have that huge bunch of condos and you have that huge parking lot right next to here."

Resident Dominic Reterra said he also supported the project as businesses and others have been leaving the area.

"It will be a great addition

to what seems like a pretty dead stretch of auto body shops, parking lots and an empty school, so if you want to go taller I would support that, along with any bike improvements on Brighton Avenue," he said.

One resident, who went by Mike, said the zoning variances were too much for the neighborhood.

"You are asking for a pretty dramatic change to the zoning," he said. "It's like two times the zoned height for the area and almost four times the zoned FAR. I was thinking about the most recent developments approved that are very close to you, 446 Cambridge, and that's much less dense. They have four or five stories with an offset in the back, and you're asking for six. I would definitely consider this kind of an extreme example of asking for too much."

Mike also said the lack of parking highlights "the parking crisis" in Allston and Brighton, and advocated for an enforceable agreement between the tenants and the landlord that they cannot bring a car to the neighborhood. Drago said that's been tested in court and has been found to be illegal.

According to the city's own data – <https://gvimes.link/ros cars> — about 80 percent of those who live in Roslindale own cars. Indeed, the number of people in Greater Boston who own a car has trended both up and down over the last few decades – <https://gvimes.link/boscars>

Boston, or at least the Greater Boston Metro Area (at least some of the criteria appears to be in Cambridge) was named the friendliest place to ditch your car for public transit – <https://gvimes.link/carless>

But Creed said it's important to note the historical data, and pointed out that local businesses could suffer if customers can't drive to reach them.

"My concern primarily is that we not end up with the parking mayhem we have in, say, Brighton or Allston; in that parking study there was already concern that within the area of Roslindale Village, the onstreet parking was largely utilized – there were some municipal parking lots not fully utilized – it's already pretty crowded during the business day and that has an impact on the businesses of the Square," he said. "That number of parking spaces has no relationship to the historical facts that we know about car ownership in Roslindale. Everyone can say, 'Gee, how terrific it will be that people won't need these cars,' but that has not been born out in any reality about what we know about car utilization in Roslindale."

Resident and Roslindale Coalition Organizer Laurie Radwin said she was happy to see the site getting an update, but questioned the methods of S+S and how it arrived at its zoning regulations.

"The problem with S+S zoning is that it doesn't approach the Square holistically," she said. "Planning has a role, Small Business (the city office) has a role, transportation has a role, but they do not seem to be talking to one another about the positives and the challenges about buildings like these. For example, small business and (Roslindale Village Main Streets) RVMS – I don't see any abutting small business owners on this call."

Radwin asked about notification, and Ross said all notifications about Boston Planning project meetings are available through an email list – <https://gvimes.link/getinvolved> – and the onus is on residents to get involved with their neighborhoods.

Radwin added that many of the small businesses in the Square have customers coming in from out of town.

"I had a conversation with an owner today about the fact that his employees and customers do not come in on public transportation, and if they don't have a place to park they'll stop coming," she said. "When you talk to even the retail owners about how the density here so far has improved their business, it has not. If you look at the abutting personal services shops, their customers – I've sat in there, I've known them for years and practiced my Spanish – their customers come from Sharon or Quincy and they drive in. They will stop coming and have stopped coming because of the parking, and especially the two-hour parking restriction and the tickets they're getting."

Next-door neighbor Julia Pelkofsky said her family is actually under-utilizing the parking in their building.

"We have three three-bedroom units and we have two cars for four parking spots," she said. "The two families that do have cars are single-car only families. My husband and I used to have a car, but we no longer do. And being right next door to this building I can speak very plainly that having a car is not necessary, and we are currently under-utilizing our parking lot. The building on the other side of this development? It's two units with two cars, only one car per unit. So I think it's a very short bus ride to Forest Hills and there are five different buses you can take, so we're never waiting long for any of them."

Resident Nikki Kong applauded the lack of parking.

"I'm definitely excited to not see 16 parking spots in this building," she said. "I actually think the Taft Terrace may have too many parking spots so I applaud the architect and developer on this for only including seven in this. I'm very excited to see high density units coming really close to Rozzie Village. I don't think everywhere in the neighborhood has the same number of car owners, and I think this location could benefit from the abundance of buses that come down Washington Street."

can Legion Highway to the substation on Hyde Park Avenue.

For West Roxbury, its southern route option would trace Hyde Park's through Tacoma Street and then break off along Metropolitan Avenue into Roslindale, turn left on Washington, continue into West Roxbury, turn right onto LaGrange, left on Centre, and then right to the Baker Street substation. The northern option would go through Jamaica Plain along the Arborway, cut through the Arboretum, follow Weld Street, and then continue onto Vermont Street toward Baker Street.

Diehl noted that both transmission lines would be installed underground, and that upgrades would be made to distribution lines (the wires between utility poles) throughout the surface area.

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State gives Canterbury Bridge update

Bridge to remain closed until at least 2028

From MassDOT: The Canterbury Street Bridge has been closed to traffic to ensure public safety since September 12th 2025, with all vehicular traffic detoured to Seymour Street, Rowe Street, and the Cummins Highway. At the time of the closure, MassDOT already had a design for the rehabilitation of the Canterbury Street Bridge in progress, and the 25% design public hearing for the project was held at the Brooke Charter School on the Cummins Highway just five days after the closure on September 17th.

At the hearing, members of

the design team shared with the community that given the impacts of the closure and detour, MassDOT would compress its design schedule to allow for the project to begin construction in late 2026 allowing for an estimated reopening of the bridge to traffic in spring 2028. We are pleased to note that thus far, this effort has been successful and at present, we remain on course to achieve the timeline laid out at the design public hearing. The 100% design was submitted to MassDOT in February of this year. The Plans, Specifications and Estimate (PS&E) –

the last major design package – is scheduled to be submitted to MassDOT in May. We continue to advance coordination with Amtrak, the MBTA, and the utility companies that operate infrastructure on the bridge to identify and address potential issues in advance to position the project for success once the construction work begins.

Our team appreciates the community's continued patience and cooperation as we advance towards advertising the project to potential contractors. Comments, concerns, or

When construction does begin, a project website will be launched to provide updates about project progress and upcoming operations. It will be announced to the public through an email (or letter) like this one. 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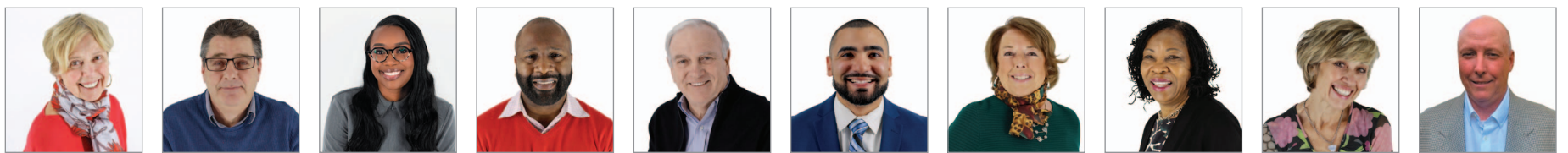
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
